

# Charitable Gaming Rules for KECC

## What you cannot do!!!!

- You cannot conduct any game of chance except a raffle.
  - A game of chance is defined as “staking or risking something of value on the outcome of a contest, game, gaming scheme, or gaming device which: (a) Is based upon an element of chance, in accord with an agreement or understanding that someone will receive something of value if there is a certain outcome; and (b) does not include a contest or game in which eligibility to participate is determined by chance and the ultimate winner is determined by skill.” 820 KAR 1:001 Section 1 (32).
- Therefore, you cannot conduct:
  - cake walk;
  - a wheel game;
  - bingo;
  - poker tournament;
  - golf ball drop; and
  - NCAA bracket.

## What you can do!!!!

- You may conduct a raffle.
  - Raffles include “split the pots.”
  - The total ticket sales for the raffle cannot be over \$150 and you can have a raffle three (3) times a year.
  - You must sell all the tickets for the same price. You cannot sell “\$1 a ticket or 3 for \$2.”
- You can sell anything (bake sales, doughnuts, ice cream, etc.)
- You can have auctions (live or silent).
- You can have an event where everyone gets something that is equal to or greater than the cost to enter.
- You can have games of skill.
  - Basketball shooting;
  - Golf putting; or
  - Guessing jellybeans in a jar.
